Stewardship Lesson 2: Discovering The Grace of Giving Yourself

CONTROL TRUTH: The living grace of God is the desire, the ability, and the power to do God's will.

TEXT: II Corinthians 8:1-7

THEME VERSE: "And this they did, not as we hoped, but first gave their own selves to the Lord, and unto us by the will of God." (II Corinthians 8:7)

PURPOSE: The churches of Macedonia were three in number. All of them are mentioned in Acts 16 and 17. They are the churches of Philippi, Thessalonica, and Berea. As we study the book of Acts and the letters of Paul to Philippi and Thessalonica, we learn the characteristics which made the Macedonians abound to every good work.
