LESSON #3: DISCOVER THE GRACE OF GIVING YOUR SUBSTANCE—PART 1

CONTROL TRUTH: The living grace of God is the desire, the ability, and the power to do God's will.

TEXT: II Corinthians 8 and 9

THEME VERSE: *"But this I say, He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully."* II Corinthians 9:6

PURPOSE: You can be a joyful giver. The discovery in your life that giving is a grace, and that it does not have to come as the result of obligation, necessity, guilt, pressure, coercion, or emotion, will turn giving into an exciting spiritual experience.

We have seen this grace of giving in the lives of the Macedonian believers. This same truth was to be taught to the Corinthian church by Titus. The lesson today, and also next week, is a study of II Corinthians 8 and 9, where Paul, the master teacher, communicates basic principles of giving by grace.

CONCLUSION: The Macedonians, by their abundant generosity, left no doubt as to the sincerity of their heart. Paul exhorts the Corinthians to confirm their love by completing the promise they made. In verse 9, Paul could not have used a better illustration as he reminds us that Christ Himself is the personification of this truth, having become poor that through His poverty we might be made rich. How could we fail to follow such a grand example?
